This narrative history of a Residential School was researched and produced by the Government of Canada as part of its response to litigation and the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement. The National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation has not verified the content of this document. It is provided here for reference purposes only. Documented incidents of sexual and physical abuse are based on the documentary record and do not take into account survivor testimony.

DOCUMENTS REFERRING TO SCHOOL INCIDENTS

We are aware of the following charges and convictions for abuse at Cariboo IRS:

Brother Glen Doughty was convicted on June 28, 1991, for abuse perpetrated at Cariboo IRS and was sentenced to 12 months in prison. He was also convicted in April 1995, and in October 2002, for abuse perpetrated at Kuper Island IRS. [RCMP News Release, April 23, 2003]

Father Harold McIntee was convicted in May 1989 for abuse perpetrated at Cariboo IRS. He was sentenced to 3 years in prison and 3 years probation. [RCMP News Release, April 23, 2003]

Bishop Hubert O'Conner was charged in 1992 for abuse perpetrated at Cariboo IRS. After two appeals to the Supreme Court, the charges were eventually stayed. [RCMP News Release, April 23, 2003]

The following suggestions of abuse, listed chronologically, comprise all known identifiable complaints and/or allegations received by government officials and all available information regarding the follow-up and outcome.

Incidents (Physical)

In February 1902, three children ran away from the school resulting in the death of one child from exposure and exhaustion. An inquiry into the death revealed allegations of physical abuse and poor conditions at the school, including students receiving excessive punishment and being forced to eat rotten food. It is alleged that the three children, including the deceased child, ran away from the school as a result of these conditions. [47074 - 47104]

In 1920, a complaint was received from the parent of a student at the school regarding a staff member who "was much too free with his cane." This parent also alleges, in reference to a case where nine children ingested hemlock, resulting in the death of one child and the illness of the remaining eight, that the children "were in a very depressed frame of mind" and ingested the poisonous weed deliberately. [47108 - 47116]

In April 1946, a police report detailed the allegations of a student regarding physical abuse by a religious resident at the school. The student alleged that the individual "walked up to him, threw him down, his stomach stricking [sic] a stick of wood, struck him with his hand, then when the [student] tried to get up, the [individual] kicked him." This individual was removed from the

school as a result of this incident. [44047 - 44053]

Incidents (Student on Student)

In 1938, a Reverend Father writes to the Provincial regarding certain Fathers in the Province. In the course of his letter, he refers to boys admitting to practicing sodomy. It is difficult to determine whether the children he is referring to are students at Cariboo IRS. He also mentions general misconduct of the Oblates, however the misconduct is not necessarily of a physical or sexual nature. [45000]

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

In 1899, a complaint by a Williams Lake resident which accused the Oblates of poor management of the school, led to an unannounced inspection of the school by the Indian Agent and School Superintendent. This inspection concluded that the charges were unfounded.

Overcrowded conditions were noted throughout the operation of the school [JP-0051] [JP-0056] [JP-0062] [27583] [JP-0645] [15113]

Farming Operations

The Oblates owned and operated the farm apart from the school [63060]

Children were working on the farm as part of vocational training at least as early as 1931 [13531]

Health Matters

In 1927, flu and meningitis outbreaks caused the death of two pupils [13190]

In 1928, an analysis of the drinking water at the school determined that it was not safe for domestic use [28761] [62003] [62003A]

In 1943, there was an outbreak of mumps that affected at least 84 students [20855]

In 1945, it appears that an annex was constructed to be used as an infirmary and for isolation purposes [JP-0060] The new school building also contained an infirmary [JP-0205]

In 1947, the hair of three students was found to be infested with nits [21223]

In 1956, there was an outbreak of measles at the school [25662]

In 1960, there were epidemics of influenza, measles, and chicken pox [60320]

In 1969, there was an infestation of bedbugs in the school dormitory [64706A]
