The property was on the west edge of the village of Lebret and bordered by a railway and provincial Highway 10 on the north side and Mission Lake on the south side. Three staff residences were located on the north side of Highway 10. The classroom buildings were located on the northwest corner of section 2 adjacent to the western edge of the Village of Lebret [PLD-009037, pg. 3; PAR-003383-0004, pg. 3; PLD-009024-0001, pg. 2]

#### **OPERATING DATES CONTEXT**

Qu'Appelle Indian Industrial School opened in 1884 on 600 acres of land on Fishing Lake on Qu'Appelle Indian Reserve [PLD-000680; PLD-000267-0001, pg. 24-25]. On January 4, 1904, a fire destroyed the main IRS building [PLD-000665]. The IRS reopened in a new building in 1906 [ELK-000451, pg. 5-6, 16-17; PLD-000002]. The IRS was destroyed again by fire on November 13, 1932 [PLD-008560]. The new residence was officially opened on May 29, 1936 [PLD-000188, pg. 4; PLD-000036-0001]. St. Paul's High School was established at the IRS in 1951, and was phased out in 1966 [PLD-000267-0001, pg. 24; PLD-000188, pg. 4]. In October 1973, the Qu'Appelle Indian Residential School Council (Q.I.R.S.C.), representing 24 District Bands, took over administration of the residence; the Oblate Fathers left in 1974 and the Grey Nuns retired in 1975 [PLD-000188, pg. 5]. The Q.I.R.S.C. also assumed control of the education program at the IRS in 1981 [PLD-000233-0001; PLD-000267-0001, pg. 25]. In July 1983, the former IRS property was established as a reserve named Wa-Pil Moos-Toosis (White Calf) of the Star Blanket Band [PLD-000264]. In 1984 the Star Blanket Band was given full power to administer the IRS [PLD-000268; PLD-007390]. When the Star Blanket First Nation closed the IRS on June 30, 1998, it was known as the White Calf Collegiate [PLD-009201-0001]. The former residence building was demolished in March 1999 [PLD-014244].

To date, we are unaware of any convictions for abuse at Lebret IRS or of any convicted abusers present at the residential school.

The following suggestions of abuse, listed chronologically, comprise all known identifiable complaints and/or allegations received by government officials and all available information regarding the follow-up and outcome.

1973	A grandparent of two students claimed that two to three Supervisors were cruel towards the pupils at the IRS. A Supervisor allegedly broke a girl's arm and then laughed. Female pupils ran away from the IRS to avoid that Supervisor [PLD-000497; PLD-000498-0001; PLD-000500].
1980	A Child Care Worker wrote to the Minister of Indian Affairs, requesting that the IRS be investigated regarding the alleged suffering of children [PLD-000194-0001].

The dentist had resided at the IRS during this period [GNB-000002, pg. 2, 57]. Dentists had visited the IRS regularly during the mid to late1950s, and 1950s some of these dental care visits had lasted months. By February 1954, a dentist had been working at the IRS for several months [GNB-000556, pg. 1, 12]. In 1955, another dentist had "passed a few months" at the IRS [GNB-000002, pg. 2, 57]. A dentist had visited in the Spring and Fall of 1957, and January 1958 [GNB-000573, pg. 1, 6, 13; GNB-000555, pg. 1, 17; GNB-000560, pg. 1, 10].

Since the Fort Qu'Appelle Hospital was unable to meet the IRS needs, the
