This narrative history of a Residential School was researched and produced by the Government of Canada as part of its response to litigation and the Indian Residential Schools Settlement
Agreement. The National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation has not verified the content of this document. It is provided here for reference purposes only. Documented incidents of sexual and physical abuse are based on the documentary record and do not take into account survivor testimony.

The Peigan Indians had provided Sacred Heart with a section of land and, in 1929, granted an additional quarter section until such time as the Band required it for its own use [#00297, #00293, #01087].

The school was located 5.5 miles East of Brocket, 12 miles from Pincher Creek [#01075A].

New day school, set to open in 1961, was to be erected on the site adjacent

to the river [#00142, #01159, #01071, #01112A].

STUDENTS FROM OTHER RESERVES

• In 1929, the Department admitted six orphan girls from the northern part of the province [#00180A].

RELIGIOUS GROUPS

- The Reverend Sisters of Charity (a.k.a Grey Nuns of Nicolet, Grey Nuns of Montreal) were involved at the school throughout its history [#00879, #01066, #00087, #00165].
- Until the school closed in 1961, the Oblates of Mary Immaculate were involved in the administration of Sacred Heart. The position of principal was always held by an Oblate Father [#00109, #00234C, #00230C, #00541].

WRITTEN AGREEMENTS

• Correspondence indicates that a 1911 Agreement regarding future maintenance and management of five Roman Catholic boarding schools was signed by the Federal Government and the Bishop of the St. Albert Diocese in March 1911. No copy of the actual agreement was found in the collection [#00048, #00051, #00052, #00053].

DOCUMENTS REFERRING TO SCHOOL INCIDENTS

To date, we are unaware of any convictions for abuse at Sacred Heart IRS or of any convicted abusers present at the school.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Major Events

- The lack of an adequate water supply was an on-going problem at Sacred Heart [#00321]. New wells were drilled several times in hopes of improving water supply [#00657, #00660A, #00662A, #00623B]. The school ran out of water on several occasions, the first time 1933, and was closed due to lack of water in 1956 and again in 1958 [#00763A, #01150, #00501]. Between 1941 and 1960 the lack of water often necessitated trucking water from Brocket to the school [#01134, #00510, #00573, #00544, #00540].
- In January 1955, the basement of Sacred Heart flooded [#01145].
- In January 1960, fire destroyed the manual training shop and adjacent storage facilities [#00594A].

School Attendance and Educational Planning

- During the 1950s, overcrowding was an issue at Sacred Heart. Children were sent off-reserve to attend other schools and high schools, including Lacombe Home, Red Deer, St. Mary's IRS, and Pincher Creek [#00932, #01082, #01144, #01146, #00118, #01149, #01163, #01153]. Certain students took their schooling by correspondence [#01108B, #01126].
- In 1955 and 1959, truancy was a problem [#01147, #01153].
- The Educational Survey Commission, appointed in 1956, reported on the educational requirements on the Peigan Reserve and recommended an increased day school program, and closing of the residential schools. Those Catholic students requiring residential care would be sent to Blood R.C. Residential School. Based on these recommendations, the Department decided to construct a six-room expandable day school for Catholic children, set to open in 1961 [#00119, #00186A,].
- In 1955, some students began attending Sacred Heart on a day school basis. This continued until the closing of the school [#01107, #01149, #00267].
- In 1960, most Sacred Heart IRS students went home on weekends [#00924].

<u>Health</u>

- In 1916, there were cases of typhoid at Sacred Heart, which were attributed to water contamination [#00061].
- A polio epidemic delayed the opening of the school in 1952 [#01140].
- Sacred Heart was closed due to influenza in 1957 [#01290].

Death of Students

- Deaths of students were reported on March 3, 1901 [#00782], March 11, 1901 [#00785], May 2, 1903 [#00804], February 29, 1904 [#00811], December 11, 1905 [#00827], and November 13, 1948 [#00251].
- On September 12, 1937, a female student was crushed between a trailer and the ice house, and died of her injuries. The staff of the school was subsequently exonerated of blame in the death [#00253, #00255A].

Other Information

• A residential school located at Fort Providence on the Mackenzie River (NWT) was also named Sacred Heart [#01353, #01356].
