This narrative history of a Residential School was researched and produced by the Government of Canada as part of its response to litigation and the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement. The National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation has not verified the content of this document. It is provided here for reference purposes only. Documented incidents of sexual and physical abuse are based on the documentary record and do not take into account survivor testimony.

The building was occupied while it was still under construction, and it was completed on August 19, 1879 [SWK-000927; WWH-000006; SWK-001285, pg. 6]. The Wawanosh Home received support from the federal government up until 1892 [SWK-000928, pg. 6-7; SWK-000933, pg. 12; SWK-000827, pg. 12-15; SWK-000938, pg. 8-9]. A report dated August 5, 1892, contains the last reference in available documents to the Wawanosh Home as an institution separate from the Shingwauk IRS [SWK-000938, pg. 2-3]. By 1893, the Wawanosh Home and the Shingwauk IRS for boys had amalgamated [SWK-000939, pg. 3].
